Celebrating the 50th Anniversary

The world surrounding artists has changed dramatically even if compared to just a few years ago. The advent of the Internet and social media has changed human lifestyles, conflicts between countries continue to appear in different places and forms, and more recently, pandemics have swept the globe. The period of 50 years is an uncannily long time.

1972 - The Japanese Artists Association of New York, Inc. (JAANY) was founded and held its first exhibition in New York. After World War II, the art scene shifted from Europe to the United States, especially to New York. Artists and art world stakeholders from all over the world moved here, and New York became an art center for creating a new culture. Young Japanese artists also came to the U.S., including Kunio Izuka, the founder and first president of JAANY. For these artists, however, the reality of life in New York was physically and mentally much more difficult than we can imagine today. With the advice of Max Bletcher, Jr., a lawyer who kindly helped them, Izuka and his artist friends established JAANY.

One person's strength may be small, but together they are a force to be reckoned with. I believe this is the underlying principle that has kept JAANY active for 50 years up until now, overcoming various difficulties. The JAANY Spirit still lives on in us.

Being an artist is also a battle with oneself. Like the world, the art world and JAANY itself, some things change and some things do not. It is natural that both art and artists themselves change in response to the remarkably changing world. However, JAANY will continue to exist as a group of artists who hold on to their beliefs and support each other in this regard. I hope that JAANY will continue to serve as a bridge between the cultures of the U.S. and Japan, and send a message of art from New York to the rest of the world.

As president of JAANY, I seek to do my best for JAANY, which has been created by our predecessors and will be realized by the artists of the future. Happy 50th anniversary!



Established and became the first president of the Japanese Artists Association of New York in 1972. Numerous solo and group exhibitions including "Anti-Nuclear" at United Nations, 1995, and "To My Atom-Bombed Father" at the museum of Ritsumeikan University, 2007. Received the Konju Hoshou award from the Japanese Government. He passed away in New York in 2020.




Rainy Day, 26" x 40", Watercolor, 2020










Reflection, 18" x 23 1/2", 2 panels, Drawing and Collage, 2022








